## Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome back to term 3.

The school is excited to announce a renovation of most teaching spaces. It will begin with the Japanese classroom early next week. ## **COVID-19 safety measures in ACT public schools and mask wearing advice**

By now you and your family should have settled back into Term 3. While COVID-19 continues to cause some uncertainty in our community our schools and the Directorate are working hard to ensure students continue to access high quality learning regardless of the public health situation.

Please read the short update on safety measures in our schools below.

## ACT Public Schools COVID-19 Management Plan for Term 3

The Education Directorate has updated its ACT Public Schools COVID-19 Management Plan for Term 3.

The Plan has been reviewed in consultation with ACT Health.

Your school will communicate with you if your child is affected. This includes any changes to how they will access their learning (if learning from home) and what that will look like, including for how long.

## A reminder about mask wearing

Masks remain an important measure to stop the spread of COVID-19 in our community and in our schools.

Alongside other <u>COVID Smart behaviours</u>, masks can help reduce transmission of COVID-19 respiratory illnesses in our schools.

Students in years 7-12 continue to be encouraged to wear a mask at school when in crowded indoors environments and where physical distancing can't be maintained. Staff and visitors to schools must also wear a mask indoors when physical distancing can't be maintained.

The Directorate, through your school will keep you updated over the Term.

ACT Health has developed an online resource on <u>acute respiratory infections in children</u> which you are encouraged to read.

## Learning in term 3

The ACT Government's priority continues to be ensuring high quality learning for all students, regardless of the public health situation. While face-to-face learning in the classroom will remain the core way students learn this term, there may be times where they will do some of their learning a little differently.

We expect COVID-19 will continue to impact schools and may limit the availability of teachers. When we are unable to support students in the classroom as a result of staff availability, there may be the need to learn online for a short time, either from home or in a supervised setting at school. We have the programs, skills, and technology to do this well and our schools have been planning to enable learning to be delivered in a number of different ways.

We know families need some level of predictability, so as much as possible, you will be given notice ahead of time if your child may be required to learn at home. As always, students who can't stay at home for any reason can still come to school and will be supervised while undertaking the same online learning activities as their peers.

We are committed to being open and transparent with our families through this journey and we value the support received from our school community to date.

## **Term 3 Planning Days**

Lastly, I'd like to remind you of the two pupil free staff planning days across ACT public schools to give teachers time for lesson planning and admin work they can't do while on class. The dates for these are Friday 5<sup>th</sup> August and Friday 9<sup>th</sup> September.

Students who can't stay at home on these days will be able to attend school for supervision and general learning activities. Colleges and some schools that have preplanned activities on these days may hold their staff planning days at another time. These schools will communicate directly with student and families about this.

I would recommend this book. But it's set out like a poem (but doesn't read like one) so it makes it tricky to read.




## Group no 14 - The Dragon Fire

## **UR FaB Understanding and Responding to Feelings and Behaviours**

**Program in Schools** 

Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS)

Hello from the UR FaB team,

Your child's school has volunteered to take part in the UR FaB early intervention program for children in primary school. The program focuses on children's emotional and social development, and while we are here at your school, the team will be contributing to the school newsletter and providing information and ideas in regard to supporting children with their social and emotional development.

**Importance of 'Together Time'.** Children from birth to adolescence need time and attention from their parents. There are number of benefits to 'Together Time':

- Helps children to feel closer to their parent and focus on their emotions and this can be a powerful influence on a child's behaviour.
- Develop a stronger bond as it encourages communication between the child and the parent, and it provides the child with the opportunity to voice their thoughts and feelings.
- The child has an opportunity to model their parent's behaviour, while the parent can observe and learn about their child's strengths and weaknesses, temperament, activity level, and developmental stage, in order to better know them and guide them.

Research suggests that it is the quality of the time spent together not the quantity that is important, and that 10 - 15 minutes per day is enough.

(Myers, 2022. <u>The Importance of Family Time on Kid's Mental Health and Adjustment to Life</u>)

#### **Quality time involves:**

- Play that is directed by the child, and a parent having their full attention to their child's world. Use time together, such as mealtimes, to talk and share a laugh. Use descriptive commenting and praise
- Avoid competing with your child and use positive communication avoiding criticism. Laugh and have fun, make it enjoyable
  - Focus on your child's strengths not his/ her weaknesses
- Don't focus on the "correct" way or specified rules for a game. Don't use it as a teaching moment.
  - Model cooperation by doing what your child asks you to do
  - Engage in pretend and make-believe play with your child
- Curb your desire to give too much help—give just enough support to avoid frustration but not so much you take over your child's exploration
- 'Attention rule' attend to positive behaviour and ignore negative behaviour (results in increased positive social behaviour in the child). Don't give eye or verbal attention to annoying behaviours

The parent child relationship is an important factor in your child's social, cognitive and emotional development. In prioritising time together and strengthening the parent child bond you are helping your child to feel safe and secure.

## **School Satisfaction & Climate Survey**

## 2022 School Satisfaction & Climate Survey 19 August to 9 September

#### **Parents and Carers**

As part of a continuous effort to improve ACT schools, the Education Directorate invites you to give feedback in an online survey about your experience of your child's school. Your responses will help our school to identify what it does well and how it can improve. The data will also be used to underpin school improvement practices and inform government priorities, as well as in research projects and longitudinal studies aimed at improving the quality of education services in the ACT.

You will be sent a separate email for each child at this school with instructions on how to complete the survey. However, if your answers to one survey are an accurate representation of your experience, there is no need to complete the other surveys. The survey should take 5-10 minutes to complete, and you can access it from any mobile device until midnight, Friday 9 September 2022.

Your participation is voluntary, but we do hope you will help. The Education Directorate is committed to ensuring this survey is accessible for all. If you have difficulty accessing or interpreting the survey, please contact the school's front office for assistance.

All personal information will be handled in accordance with the Territory Privacy Principles set out in the Information Privacy Act 2014. Details about how personal information is stored and used are available in our Privacy Policy (available at education.act.gov.au). Your responses will be only reported and used in aggregate with responses from other students. No personal identifying information will be provided to any school or college.

#### **Students Years 4-6**

The student survey is administered as a classroom task and takes 15-20 minutes to complete. In addition to items developed to measure satisfaction, the survey includes a school climate module that forms part of a longitudinal study being conducted in partnership with researchers at the Australian National University (ANU).

Key elements of school climate include school identification (a sense of belonging and connection to school), academic emphasis (support and encouragement of learning and success), relationships (feeling valued and respected in dealings with others) and a sense of shared mission, rules and processes in the school, which are important indicators of educational outcomes and quality of the learning environment.

At the start of the survey, student identification numbers will be used to confirm the identity of students and enable survey responses to be linked over time and with administrative and performance data. Connecting data in this way will help researchers to assess relationships between improvements in school climate and educational outcomes and enable a better understanding of patterns over time.

All personal information will be handled in accordance with the Information Privacy Act 2014. Details about how personal information is stored and used are available in our Privacy Policy (available at education.act.gov.au). No personal identifying information will be provided to any school or college.
